You are our HVAC estimator tell us about your work history.

Sometimes we hear about others experiences in pre-fab, or new words in the industry like DfMA (design for manufacture and assembly), or macro and micro pre-fab. It is also interesting to hear which project delivery methods are becoming more common so we can anticipate what we should plan for.

My only kid is 3, and he is pretty good at getting me to pay attention to him. For example, the other day I was starting to wind down on playing with the magna-tiles and so he whispered that he will give me a dollar if I would keep playing with him.
